Our Story

Our Mission

The Future Farmers Foundation was established by Judy Stuart in 2006. During her years as a dairy farmer, Judy had the opportunity to meet many young people from rural communities with a passion for farming, but with no financial means to support their interest. She knew that with the right structures in place, apprenticeships on farms would allow disadvantaged youth to step up onto the ladder of education and work experience which could transform their lives. The Future Farmers Foundation gained NPO status in 2011.

Today, Future Farmers places learners on farms through an apprenticeship system where they gain valuable experience. Starting on the lowest wage, these apprentices work their way up as their skills and abilities improve. The apprentices are evaluated by their employers and by a Future Farmers mentor.

After the practical experience, the apprentices who excel in their work may be selected to do a years' internship abroad, where they are exposed to high quality work standards and work ethics, which will enable them to become future leaders in their communities.

The programme offers 12 month internships in countries that include Australia, New Zealand, and the USA. The goal is for the interns to learn advanced skills and learn about different cultures and countries. They return to South Africa to the benefit of their communities, agriculture at large, and of course their personal careers.

Our mission is to empower the disadvantaged youth of South Africa who are passionate about pursuing careers in agriculture. We do this by offering the soft skills training and mentoring necessary to achieve their career goals, as well as to create opportunities for them to acquire the practical skills to become successful leaders in the agricultural industry.

Our Vision

Our vision is to become the leading nonprofit organisation in South Africa to facilitate agricultural apprenticeships for rural disadvantaged youth, resulting in skills growth, increased employment, poverty reduction and increased national and international food security, by developing competent and valuable farmers and farm managers.



Our Values

At Future Farmers we take our values seriously, and all of our work is underpinned by our foundational values: Passion, Integrity, Positivity and Individual Growth

Passion

Without an authentic passion for what one is doing in life, it will be challenging to lead a life that is fulfilling and of value to oneself. At Future Farmers we work specifically with young people who have a passion for agriculture, who thrive on working in a varied environment and who invite challenges as opportunities for growth. Similarly, the people who work in our offices are passionate about helping and training young people, and passionate about levelling the playing field for those who are willing and ready to work hard and carve a place for themselves in the world.

Integrity

Being a person of integrity is a core value for Future Farmers, as is being an organisation of integrity. Being honest, owning ones mistakes, always being transparent and sincere are qualities that all employers value.





Positivity

In a world of challenges, a positive attitude goes a long way. When Judy Stuart first started talking to farmers about creating apprenticeships for rural youth, she was met with "Nice idea, but it'll never work". Judy refused to be brushed off and with a positive can-do attitude she went ahead and started making connections, trying new ideas and establishing partnerships until it worked so well that Future Farmers was placing 100 apprentices a year on farms nationally and internationally. Positivity, particularly when times are challenging, is a key value within Future Farmers as an organisation and is instilled in our apprentices from the get-go.

Individual Growth

Each person that works with Future Farmers is an individual, and as such we don't believe in a 'one size fits all' approach to learning and work. People have their own interests and ideas that drive them and create their unique journeys. To truly love their work they need to have their passions nurtured through flexibility and different learning opportunities. It is in this way that individuality is supported and encouraged at Future Farmers.

What We Do

The Work Integrated Learning Programme

Through a 4 Phase approach, Future Farmers aims to take on young people as apprentices who are placed on farms all around South Africa. This is called the **Work Integrated Learning** (WIL) Programme.

In **Phase 1**, candidates apply and are interviewed to assess their suitability and so that they can understand the programme better and decide if it suits their needs.

In **Phase 2**, when candidates are accepted, they work an apprenticeship in South Africa. If candidates have a tertiary qualification related to agriculture, the apprenticeship is 2 years, if they have a matric certificate, it is five years. Apprentices learn practical farming skills and undergo a number of theory based courses in a range of subjects.



Future Farmers International Programme

When apprentices successfully complete their 2-year contracts, they enter into **Phase 3**. Not all apprentices will move into Phase 3, as they must have proven themselves to be a person of integrity with an excellent work ethic that is supported by testimonies from their employers. Some apprentices also stay on with their current employers if they have settled in well and others move on to other work opportunities in South Africa.

For successful apprentices who have developed good communication skills, enjoy working with other people and are prepared to meet high standards of performance, Future Farmers works to place them on our International Programme. Interns spend one year abroad in the USA, New Zealand or Australia.

Interns experience farming on a whole new level, particularly as international farms operate using far less labour and are often more mechanised. They come back confident, versatile people who have learned new skills, and understand farming and relationships with employers and colleagues with a fresh perspective.

Interns have all their costs sponsored as a loan with Future Farmers, and as they start to earn they pay back their loans. This typically takes around 4 months, as they earn well overseas. The repaid funds are used to send the next intern overseas, creating a rolling system of funding.



When an intern returns after their year abroad, they enter **Phase 4**. Most find management positions and some return to the farms where they did their initial apprenticeship as their employers are eager to have them back. Many have savings that allow them to study further, typically finance courses, which bolster their employability even more.

Future Ready Programme



The Future Ready Programme is a new 12 month training series. It has been designed around a need for apprentices to become more prepared for the formal work environment, through the feedback and experiences of apprentices and farmers over several years.

It is easy to take for granted that all young people should understand interview etiquette for example, but in reality not everyone is afforded exposure to job interviews or training on this during their school years. Likewise if a person needs to leave a job for a new opportunity, being trained in how to resign and how to ensure one leaves an employer on a good note with a positive relationship is important.

There are 10 modules:

Impact

The Future Farmers Foundation has had a profound impact over the 17 years it has been operational. A lot has changed since the early days though, and after we became a registered NPO in 2011 we were able to expand our operations to increase our impact.

We have 3341 Future Farmer members.

What this means is that we have **3341**people registered on our database who still receive communications from us. Each one of these people entered the Future Farmers programme either as an apprentice or an intern. Every member is able to reach out to Future Farmers when they need assistance, and if we don't hear from members, generally it means they are successfully employed and no longer need support from us.

Since 2016 we have placed *720 apprentices on farms in South Africa.

WIL has been running for 6 generations, and was established in 2016. Annually, we place a minimum of 100 apprentices on farms, with approximately *20 replacement apprentices for those who find other jobs or who decide farming is not for them.



Since 2015 we have placed 150 on farms internationally.

Through our International Programme, we have sent 150 people who have completed their apprenticeships over to the USA, Australia and New Zealand to spend a year working on large-scale farms. This means that in 8 years we've facilitated the entry of 150 qualified and experienced young farmers back into the South African economy. In particular, we've helped people who would never have been accepted into South African institutions of tertiary agricultural studies due to the invisible barriers of their educational and financial backgrounds. For us, this is a huge success as our programme is an example of how transformation and breaking down of barriers of disadvantage can take place.
